COURSE OBJECTIVES AND LEARNING OUTCOME

The Deepwater Horizon blowout resulted in more than 500,000 claims and payments of more than \$60 billion, and the waters of the United States are faced with collisions, allisions, injuries, spills, and discharges every day. Admiralty Environmental and Insurance Claims teaches the civil and criminal remedies available for the environmental claims resulting from these incidents as well as the insurance issues applicable when there is a maritime accident. Therefore, the course covers the statutory and common law applicable to pollution of our nation's waters, including the various remedies available, how to pursue the remedies, and the defenses available to them. It also covers the different types of insurance available for marine risks; what is covered and what is not covered in marine policies; limitations on insurance coverage by contract, statute, common law, and public policy; and extra-contractual remedies available against marine insurers.
