<u>Course Objectives.</u> In this class, we will develop and improve your legal writing skills. These skills will be critical to your success during law school, on the bar exam, and in your legal practice.

This semester, you will:

- Build on the legal research and writing skills that you learned last semester.
- Translate legal research and analysis into persuasive writing that is organized effectively, conveys relevant content clearly, and omits extraneous matters.
- Understand Greenbook citations.
- Understand considerations underlying contract negotiation and drafting to address the client's needs effectively.
- Improve grammar, punctuation, and style.
- Conduct yourself professionally both in person and in writing.

Required Texts.

<u>Technology.</u> We will be writing and researching regularly in class. Bring your laptop, Westlaw password, and Lexis password to every class. I will post assignments, PowerPoints, exercises, and home reading on Canvas.

Assessments. Your grade will be determined based on your performance of several tasks.

Your motion and contract assignments will be graded anonymously.

<u>Deadlines.</u> You are responsible for meeting the deadlines in this syllabus. Failure to meet deadlines will result in a reduction to your grade. Assignments turned in late without an extension will result in

a grade reduction. I will consider extensions for true emergencies only. Be advised: computer problems and routine illnesses do not constitute true emergencies.

<u>Professionalism.</u> This class will meet in person. Before each class, complete the assignments and readings listed in the syllabus. Be prepared to discuss the lecture material that I assign for each class. I will call on you at random.

Arrive at class on time. During class, do not leave the room unless you must attend to urgent matters. I take attendance at the beginning of each class. You will be subject to dismissal if you miss more than 80% of classes. If you are facing any issues that affect your attendance, please let me know as soon as possible.

<u>Mutual Respect.</u> I want to address each of you in a manner that respects your name and identity. Please reach out to me at any time if you have concerns about how I address you, including the pronunciation of your name. You may call me "Professor Crozier."

<u>Honor Code</u>. The UHLC Honor Code will apply to all aspects of this course. You are responsible for knowing all Honor Code provisions and complying with the Honor Code. Among other things, this means that you may NOT work together on any assignments for this class unless otherwise instructed by me. You may not plagiarize another's work. And you may not share your own work with another student.

Generative AI. This course teaches you to write and think about legal issues, and it is critical that you learn to do so without the aid of generative AI (such as ChatGPT, Protégé, and CoCounsel). After all, you will not have access to AI on the Bar exam. Additionally, at this time, generative AI continues to hallucinate when presented with complex—and sometimes not-so-complex—research and writing tasks. It fabricates cases, citations, facts, and holdings. In legal practice, you may be subject to sanctions or attorney discipline if you include such hallucinations in your writing.

Thus, I urge you to complete your assignments without generating text from AI chatbots. However, if you choose to use generative AI on any part of your take-home assignments, you do so at your own risk. You must thoroughly review, edit, and cite check any text that it produces. If you misrepresent a case's facts, holdings, or existence in an assignment, your grade on that assignment will be significantly reduced, and you will likely fall at the bottom of the curve in this course.
