Course Objectives

This semester you will continue to develop and refine the legal writing, analysis, and research skills you learned last semester. This semester you will apply those skills in the context of persuasive writing.


As we did last semester, we will continue to explore a variety of additional legal skills and forms of legal communication. Classroom sessions will again be a combination of lecture, group work, and experiential learning simulations.

Additionally, this semester we will explore contract drafting and other legal drafting skills. You will have the opportunity to edit a contract and draft a contract.

Course Rules, Policies, and Procedures

As with last semester, participation and effort points will be scaled.

Course Grade

As was the case last semester, participation and effort points will be awarded for completing various course assignments such as citation exercises, Core Grammar exercises, and preliminary writing assignments to a reasonable effort standard. These points will be scaled and included in the overall point total.

After you have missed 20%, I will submit your name to the Associate Dean for Student Affairs with a recommendation that you be dropped from the course.
